- Nov. 26. 67. to —. Rejoices in the advancement and exaltation of brother C[ampion] and his fellows. He had looked for this end of his disputation. God will judge his impertinent and malicious witnesses. There be men in the world which drink blood as easily as beasts do water. He knows Campion will protest his pure innocency at his death. Reflections on the state of the Catholic cause, with verses beginning—

"The Crosse appeares, Christ doth approche,
A comfort to us all."

- Nov. 26. 68. Note of all such sums of money as have been already answered into the receipt of the Exchequer, as well of the 15ths and 10ths granted in the 23rd year of Her Highness's reign, as also of the subsidy granted the same year, until the 26th of November, 1851.
